







Susan Dalgety and 'The Women Who Wouldn't Wheesht' interviewed by Jo Bartosch and Nick Wallis





Fiona McAnena grew up in Northern Ireland, graduated from Cambridge University, and worked in brand management and marketing strategy.




Nick Wallis and 'The Great Post Office Scandal', interviewed by Bex from Inciteful Sisters Podcast


Nick lives in Surrey, is married with three children and will buy a drink for anyone who claims to have read his second book, Depp v Heard the unreal story.

Susanna Rustin is the social affairs leader writer for the Guardian and book Sexed is a retelling of the story of British feminism from a gender-critical point of view. Starting in the revolutionary 1790s, it introduces the 1830s radicals who demanded "LIBERTY FOR EVER!", Victorian crusaders against sexual exploitation, and rival camps of suffragists. This book argues that differences between male and female bodies have always been feminist issues.
